Welcome to the inaugural Sorrento Writers Festival. the generosity of our friends at The Portsea Camp

Our four-day gathering of great ideas in the beautiful seaside town of Sorrento runs from Thursday April 27 to Sunday April 30. More than 140 writers, academics, journalists, publishers, thinkers and creators will appear across 90+ events in Sorrento and Portsea.

In Australia, we are blessed with some brilliant literary events. 2023 kicked off with terrific festivals in Perth and Adelaide, and soon it will be Melbourne, Sydney and Brisbane's turn. Byron Bay is in August, and in-between we have gatherings around regional Victoria, including Bendigo, Queenscliff, Port Fairy and Dunkeld.

Into this space comes the Sorrento Writers Festival. Our ambitions are vast, and our goals focused: we want our annual four-day gathering to be a beacon for year-round Mornington Peninsula literary activities. We want to bring writers and readers together. We want to host amazing discussions that fuel imaginations and creativity. We want people to feel safe in a room where views are respected, and everyone is listened to and welcomed.

Our new cultural organisation has a mission: Sorrento has no library and so we plan to establish one. Also, many children on the Mornington Peninsula struggle with reading and learning. We want to work with local organisations to provide funds and help improve literacy among our children.

But first, we have a festival to launch. And the excitement is palpable. Writers want to come here. Book lovers want to meet their author heroes. Everyone wants to be a part of this beautiful community - a place where bay and ocean come together.

Some of Australia's finest thinkers and creators are coming to Sorrento, and they're ready to chat. None of this would be possible without the financial assistance of many generous individuals, families and businesses and we thank them for their support. We also thank the Mornington Peninsula Shire Council, the supporter of our Saturday Words & Music event via its annual Drift Arts Festival. (And we acknowledge

who have so enthusiastically provided their venue for the night.) Our Festival is fortunate to have the support of many local businesses and community organisations plus an incredible band of volunteers. We thank everyone for their amazing donations of money, time, venues, resources and expertise.

Playwright Hannie Rayson is fascinated how other writers write. In this session, she will ask three best-selling authors whether they plot with precision or fly by the seat of their pants.




