

Welcome to the 2025 Sorrento Writers Festival

In the Introduction to Watsonia: A Writing Life, historian and award-winning author Don Watson writes: "I never set out to be a writer but drifted into it."

The Sorrento Writers Festival never set out to be Victoria's biggest literary festival; we drifted into it. Our inaugural festival in 2023 was a toe-in-water experiment to see if people would come. Last year, we built on that experiment by staging 135 events and welcoming 190 speakers to our coastal township.

We sold 15,736 tickets and provided opportunities for around 6000 festival-goers to meet and listen to some of Australia's greatest writers, thinkers, creators and leaders.

In just two years, Sorrento has developed a deep affection for its literary festival. We've welcomed visitors from Melbourne, from regional Victoria and from interstate. And we are now an Australian cultural calendar highlight.

In 2025, we are back – bigger (more than 160 events and 200-plus participating speakers), with new venues and an ambition to build a fiscally responsible, year-round, not-for-profit organisation that supports children's literacy projects on the Mornington Peninsula.

Sydney producer and podcaster Kel Butler not long ago said: "Writers festivals are a reflection of where our country is at at any given moment.

"They put a megaphone to the national and global social issues that our governments are either creating, exacerbating or ignoring completely."

In 2025, we need these megaphones more than ever before. And as our Festival's success shows, people are keen to listen. They want to hear respected Australians discuss Big Picture issues. They are prepared to be prodded and challenged, and they are keen to hear new ideas.

Our speakers are also up for the adventure. This year, more than 200 writers, publishers, community leaders, opinion

makers, journalists, artists, musicians, creators, inventors and academics will come to Sorrento to discuss a plethora of topics. From historical fiction to footy, to faith, film, Shakespeare, Countdown, geopolitics and gardening, we have offerings for people of all ages and interests.

Fiction writers will discuss how their imaginations work and why they create the plots and characters they do. Biographers will talk about the challenges of writing someone else's life story. Meanwhile, award-winning journalists will tell us what it's like to work in a profession where their stories are regularly described as "fake news".

How gaga is MAGA? What is the role of civilised conversation in a democracy? Telling the truth about Australia's history. Who is running our corporate world and are they up to the job? Stop hurting our women. Fifty years since the dismissal of the Whitlam government and what have we learnt? How to handle China? Books vs screens, parents' great battle. These are just some of the weighty topics our speakers will tackle in Sorrento in April.

Sorrento Writers Festival will deliver some difficult, tough conversations. And not everyone will like them. But just as we celebrate freedom of speech, we celebrate freedom of choice. Come to our events however and whenever you choose.

Thank you for your support, thank you for buying tickets and we look forward to welcoming you to Sorrento April 24-27.

From our Festival President

On behalf of the Committee and the Festival team, we present to you the 2025 program. Over four and-a-half days, more than 200 speakers will engage and entertain across 160-plus events. And everyone is welcome.

It is remarkable to think back to November 2021 when the Sorrento Writers Festival was just an idea sketched on a piece of paper. The inaugural

event was held in April 2023. One year later, in 2024, Sorrento Writers Festival became Victoria's biggest literary gathering in terms of tickets sold, festival events and number of speakers

This year, we expand our schools program to include Mornington Peninsula Secondary School students who will be treated to a special Shakespeare morning. We'll also be hosting a community family afternoon where children can engage with their writer and illustrator heroes. Our belief is that if children interact with books, their literacy skills improve, learning becomes a passion, reading becomes easier, their imaginations are sparked and school is an exciting place in which to thrive.

Please know that the Sorrento Writers Festival is committed to supporting literacy and reading projects for children. Throughout the year, we will be working with schools to connect young readers and writers. We are now a year-round not-for-profit cultural and community organisation. And the future is very exciting.

The Festival once again will offer several free events as part of our Writers on Writing series. Students under 25 will receive free entry to all mainstream Festival sessions. We also have some special evening gatherings, including two Words & Music concerts (Friday and Saturday), an "in conversation" with British crime writer Sir Ian Rankin, who will beam in from Edinburgh, the annual Barry Jones Oration, which this year sold out in three hours and will be delivered by former Prime Minister Julia Gillard, and the much-loved Talking Footy night.

I am enormously proud of our hard-working Committee -Narelle Cormack, Rose Donohoe, Nicholas Martin and Mandy Rethus – and thank them for their immense contribution. Our Director and Founder Corrie Perkin and her small team continue to dream big, raise the bar and work hard to achieve our goal to become one of Australia's most important literary festivals and we all congratulate them for putting together such a fine 2025 program.

To our 130-plus volunteers, and to those local community organisations who get behind our annual event with gusto, to our partners and donors, and to you, our festival-goers, we offer heartfelt thanks. Without your support, there would be no writers festival. You are our greatest advocates and our treasured friends.

We hope you enjoy the 2025 Sorrento Writers Festival. Welcome to our beautiful coastal town, and we look forward to seeing you on April 24-27.

I think there are two hopes that writers have when they come to festivals. One is to meet their readers: the other is to be reminded, sometimes after sustained solitude, that they're part of an ecosystem they have work friends, collaborators, even rivals.

Sorrento Writers Festival delivers on both needs in the best possible ways. There are big, generous audiences who

are engaged and well read. There are panels that might plonk you between the hero who inspired you to take up the craft and a whip-smart newcomer who's busy re-defining it.

Then there are the ways in which this festival is like no other, things that in two short years have already become institutions: the phenomenal roster of journalists, the inter-session crush on the staircase and the calendar position that entwines Essendon-Collingwood with a literary festival like Laocoön and

There's disagreement – a vital, civilising function for which the wider community has lost patience. And the green shoots that disagreement brings - bravery, humility, clarity.

Add to that the feeling of finding your book nestled next to the ones by the hero and the prodigy in the nation's best pop-up bookstore, the extraordinary band of volunteers, the coffee, the ocean and the autumn afternoon sun on the limestone, and I don't know why you'd be anywhere else.

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How the program evolved

This year our Festival will bring to Sorrento more than 200 writers, academics, commentators, community leaders, artists, business experts, former politicians – and a former prime minister.

We have scientists and researchers coming to Sorrento, award-winning journalists, musicians and actors, a famous television scriptwriter and a treasured Australian of the Year.

Some of the nation's most respected First Nations writers and leaders will be with us. Children's storybook authors and illustrators, sporting heroes, opera singers, Shakespeare performers and a former director of the National Gallery of Victoria are all joining our Festival in April

Discussions will be far-ranging and thought-provoking. Like previous years, they will cover a vast range of topics – from the 2025 Federal Election to Donald Trump's America (Part Two) and the curious rise and rise of Elon Musk.

During our Festival we will talk about romance novels and why we love them. We'll acknowledge the 100th anniversary of F. Scott Fitzgerald's *The Great Gatsby* and ask: is it truly the Great American Novel?

We will talk about crime novels, we will meet Miles Franklin Award winners and nominees, we'll assess the impact of Gough Whitlam and his government, 50 years after the dismissal.

We will discuss (and listen to) music and poetry. We'll talk about gardens, Jane Austen, the power of Indigenous art, 21st century feminism, Ukraine's future, how to get your novel published, the power of



water to heal and restore, how to nurture future leaders, screenwriting, racism, parenting, the post-Covid generation. And yes, we'll talk about footy, too.

Putting the 2025 program together, I was guided by four lightbulb moments.

The first occurred midway through last year when I was digging through some old family photographs and realised 2025 is the 50th anniversary of the dismissal of the Whitlam Government.

This date also made me realise that in 2025, we are completing the first quarter of the 21st century.

How far have we come? What have we achieved? Are we better or worse off as a planet, a species, as a community, as families, as individuals? These are big questions worthy of some interesting discussions

But back to Gough. Many of us can still remember exactly where we were when we heard the news that Sir John Kerr had sacked the prime minister. After just three years, the government that had promised – and indeed delivered – so much, mismanaged its way out of office.

What was that shooting star that flew across our national orbit? What did you think at the time? There is no doubt Gough Whitlam and his ministers forever changed the way Australia saw itself. They initiated Australia's first federal legislation on human rights, the environment and heritage. They made university education free, they abolished conscription and brought Australian troops home from Vietnam. They made huge progress in the area of Indigenous rights and recognition, multiculturalism, they threw money at the arts, welfare, the regions.

Like all fun parties, the music had to stop some time. To this day, Gough Whitlam has fierce and bitter critics. But what happened, how did it happen – and how did Australia find the courage to shift from the conservative Menzies era to Gough in just seven years? Why was he sacked and how did that day unfold? Will Australian politics ever see another visionary charismatic leader like Gough Whitlam?

The 50th anniversary is an appropriate moment to reflect. That's why we have invited (among others) historian and Whitlam biographer Jenny Hocking, Barry Jones, a Victorian MP during the Whitlam years, Kerry O'Brien who, as a young reporter covered the Vietnam moratoriums and followed Canberra closely during that time, historian Judith Brett, and David Marr, Sir Garfield Barwick's biographer and one of our nation's most astute journalists and commentators, to join these conversations.

1975 was also the year a young Australian academic, Anne Summers, published her seminal feminist work *Damned Whores and God's Police*. Anne went on to have a successful international career as a journalist and magazine editor. She also worked with various PMs departments as an adviser – most recently, on the topic of violence against Australian women. We are delighted that Anne is joining us for four sessions across the festival weekend, including an "in conversation" with Ramona Koval

In late 1974, a colourful and exciting new pop music show called *Countdown* went to air on the ABC. In 1975 it was the first Australian program to go live in colour. The yellow catsuit of Skyhooks lead singer Graeme "Shirley" Strachan beamed into our living rooms and Australian rock music was never the same.

My second Festival lightbulb moment was last May. While assessing ticket sales data for the 2024 event, we realised those events relating to the US, the future of democracy and the then-forthcoming November presidential election were off-the-charts popular. Our festival-goers love politics, they love American





politics. They treasure democracy and its institutions and they are interested in the world around us.

Donald Trump will notch 100 days as president – for the second time – over our Festival four days. With the Great Disrupter back in the White House, and given last year's box office, we wanted to make sure audiences were presented with discussions they'd appreciate.

My third light bulb moment: the 2025 Federal Election. For months and without knowing the date, we worked in the dark. Six months ago the pundits were predicting a clear return of the Albanese Government. Meanwhile, if there was to be a May election and all the Canberra journos are on the campaign trail, who will be free to come to our annual Political Lunch at The Baths?

Thankfully we have nailed again a fabulous Canberra commentator team. The campaign and the thorny issues has it raised will be discussed over the weekend

A final light bulb went off during the back half of 2024 as we watched some of Australia's greatest writers accept – or be shortlisted for – exceptional literary awards.

Our literary writers continue to inspire us with their imaginations and their belief in their work. We are thrilled to include in our line-up a wide range of authors, including award-winners, authors of 20 or more books, the next wave – the talented under-40s – and the debut authors who will share with us their own writing journeys.



Who's coming to Sorrento in 2025?

Former Prime Ministerr Julia Gillard will deliver this year's Barry Jones Oration. Also on the guestlist: Pulitzer Prizewinning writer Geraldine Brooks; the brilliant and extraordinary Helen Garner; twice Miles Franklin winner Michelle de Kretser; Robert Dessaix, Robbie Arnott and Jock Serong; crime writers Dervla McTiernan, Christan White, Chris Hammer, J.P. Pomare and Shelley Burr, and a legend of Australian publishing, Di Morrissey.

Thinkers, policy-makers, former politicians, academics and researchers, such as 2024 Australian of the Year pathologist Richard Scolyer and medical director of the Victorian Melanoma Institute Professor Victoria Mar will be with us.

Kim Williams, Chair of the ABC, is coming. So, too, Professor Marcia Langton, whose new co-authored book, 65,000 Years: A Short History of Australian Art, on the history of Indigenous Art, is outstanding and beautiful.

Highlighting good journalism and offering our community a chance to celebrate – rather than attack – our nation's media is an important foundation stone of the Sorrento Writers Festival.

This year we will welcome Adele Ferguson, Paul Kelly, Kerry O'Brien, Eric Beecher, Stan Grant, Joe Aston, Norman Swan, Alan Kohler, Virginia Trioli, Rick Morton, John Silvester, Greg Sheridan, Caroline Wilson, Paddy Manning and Erik Jensen, among many other award-winning scribes.

If you love food, we have your back. Visiting chefs and cookbook authors will include Annie Smithers, Ben Shewry, Karen Martini, Alice Zaslavsky and Julia Busuttil Nishimura.

Among the new literary voices, we have plenty of rock stars, including Luke Horton, Raeden Richardson, Santilla Chingaipe, Gail Holmes, Kate Wild, Isaiah Firebrace, Aarti Betigeri, Marion Taffe, Madeleine Cleary and Jane Yang.

Reading to children and the importance of giving a book to little readers and encouraging their imaginations and creativity is a big part of our festival

script. Our schools program this year extends to two days and we'll also be bringing secondary school students from Dromana and Rosebud Secondary Colleges to see Shakespeare performed in Sorrento.

What better way to connect children with books than to bring their heroes to Sorrento? Among our storytellers we will welcome Alison Lester, Isabelle Carmody, Judith Rossell, Tony Armstrong, Jane Godwin and Anna Walker.

Speaking of anniversaries, 2025 marks the 250th anniversary of Jane Austen's birth. We have an exciting breakfast session planned around this. And in the year of an election campaign, our Breakfast with the Bard this year will look at the political plays of William Shakespeare, the power struggles, the heroes and the villains.

Talking Footy is back. And we'll have a couple of late-in-the-day sessions, under the somewhat inventive titles 'Drinks with the Journos', 'Drinks with the Publishers' and 'Drinks with the Sportswriters'. These informal sessions offer our Festival attendees a chance to hear the other side of how stories are made, how they sometimes fall apart, win awards, find friends and enemies alike, and how every now and then they change thinking, legislation, policy – and then change people's lives.

On Friday April 25 our Festival will pause until 1pm to honour Anzac Day, its traditions and our fallen heroes. I am thrilled and delighted that this year we will host biographer Peter FitzSimons in conversation to talk about his new book on World War I hero Albert Jacka. We will also welcome lawyer and former TV producer Steve Vizard whose new book Nation, Memory, Myth: Gallipoli and the Australian Imaginary is certain to create discussion.

None of this vast and extraordinary offering would be possible without the participation of our writer and speaker friends. Their excitement about coming to Sorrento has been infectious and we thank them for giving so generously their time, their ideas and their insights. We are also grateful to the Australian publishing houses who work with us throughout the year to ensure their authors are represented at Victoria's biggest literary festival.

On behalf of our tiny Festival team whose dedication, creativity, great ideas and hard work inspire me every day, we hope you enjoy our 2025 program and wish you a wonderful long weekend.

Sorrento-Portsea RSL

Founded in 1919, the Sorrento-Portsea RSL brings together a strong community to honour the spirit of service and mateship. The building, tucked down below George Street, has a long tradition as a local hub for celebrations, commemorations and community support. It is home to the generations-old Tom Katz Live Music and Entertainment venue as well as the fabulous Sorrento Thai Restaurant and Jack's Bar and Lounge, and The Terrace.

Sorrento-Portsea RSL is a proud community-based, volunteer-run and not-for-profit organisation. There are no gaming machines and club members are proud to tell you its operation is supported by the hard work of members.

Ellen Grant Hall and St Andrew's Presbyterian Church

The limestone St Andrew's Church was built in 1888 (it is one of only three intact limestone churches left on the Peninsula) and is one of Sorrento's finest buildings. Next door, the timber Ellen Grant Hall – a popular Festival venue – was built in 1937. Both buildings are a three-minute walk from The Continental's Festival hub.

Sorrento Museum

The Nepean Historical Society established its Museum in the Mechanics' Institute, a National Trust-classified building built of local limestone in 1876-77. The Museum is home to the Heritage Gallery, multimedia and lecture facilities, an extensive photo collection and documentary archive. Research and copying services are available on request, and visitors can search some open indexes and material online.

Sorrento Bowls Club

Sorrento Bowls Club is an iconic destination on the Mornington Peninsula and offers personalised barefoot bowls sessions year round, plus competitive pennant and social bowls from September until July. It is the oldest bowls club on the Mornington Peninsula and has been welcoming locals and tourists alike since 1934.

Festival events are held in the clubhouse, which can be accessed via Hotham Street or the football oval, the David Macfarlan Reserve.

The Sorrento Bowls Club is a 7-10 minute walk from the main street.





Tom Wright



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
What's on at The Continental

As Point Nepean Road turns south to climb the hill to Sorrento's main street, the majestic structure of one of the Mornington Peninsula's great landmarks comes into view.

The Continental Hotel, built and opened in 1875, is said to be the largest limestone structure in the southern hemisphere. It is also the Sorrento Writers Festival Hub and for four days in April, becomes the heart of intense literary activity.

In late 2021, a few months before it re-opened after a massive \$120 million redevelopment, Festival Director Corrie Perkin discussed with representatives from The Continental, and its site colleague the InterContinental Hotel, the possibility of hosting her bold new writers festival idea.

The owners and management team were keen and 18 months later, in April 2023, the inaugural Sorrento Writers Festival was launched in Halcyon Hall at The Continental.

The Continental Hotel sits on the traditional lands of the Boonwurrung/Bunurong people of the Kulin nation. For thousands of years, Boonwurrung/Bunurong people managed the lands and waterways, but their traditional way of life was interrupted by the arrival of European settlers in the early 19th century.

Half-a-century later in the 1870s, George Coppin, a politician and theatrical entrepreneur based in Melbourne, arrived in the area and named the town after the Italian resort town of the same name. Coppin established the Sorrento Ocean Amphitheatre Company, sold off allotments of land, built seaside villas, The Continental Hotel, a pier and sea baths.

In 2018, work started on a major redevelopment of the original Victorian building, with additional accommodation and amenities' buildings added to Coppin's master plan.

Our two main Festival spaces from April 24-27 are Halcyon Hall on level two, and The Ballroom on the mezzanine level.

This year, the ground floor Barlow nightclub will become the Speakers' Green Room area with a bigger box office area

Festival-goers need never leave The Continental. In-house lunch, dinner and all-day grazing are available from the Atrium, the Conti Bar and the Beer Garden, as well as coffee and snack stations dotted around the hotel.

And for fine dining, we recommend Audrey's on level one. Named after chef Scott Pickett's grandmother, this elegant space was recently described by The Age Good Food Guide team as "a special-occasion-worthy room with a killer wine list and a menu that will please most people ..."





Sorrento is unique in that it's located on the skinny end of the peninsula, where it's walking distance between the calm, pristine beaches of Port Phillip Bay and the wild, rugged Bass Strait. Our slice of the peninsula is home to lush parks, awe-inspiring walks and magical places to take a dip.

As well as offering plenty of ways to immerse yourself in the natural world, our pretty town features several spots to dust off the cobwebs or find a sense of serenity. Those looking to boost wellbeing can do it here in Sorrento.

Sorrento Foreshore and Jetty

If time is of the essence, explore Sorrento's foreshore and jetty – the backdrop in several scenes of Hannie Rayson's classic play, Hotel Sorrento. It's also the site of what was once Erlandsen's Sea Baths, which featured diving poards and saltwater baths heated by briquettes, plus an adjoining tearoom. Festival venue The Baths now stands in its place.


Sorrento-Portsea **Artists' Trail**

What could be better than blending exercise, jaw-dropping vistas and art? This trail takes in 14 of our most stunning locations through the eyes of such artists as Sir Arthur Streeton, Arthur Boyd and John Perceval. Journey between each reproduced painting by car or foot, starting at Websters Corner Beach (local tip: grab a coffee from nearby St Paul's General Store before embarking) and then wind your way via Sorrento Park through part of the Millionaire's Walk in Portsea, as well as London Bridge. Your last stop is the eternally charming Diamond Bay.



Sorrento Historic Park

Adjacent to local institution Hotel Sorrento, Sorrento Park has manicured lawns, flower gardens and large trees, as well as picnic tables and a wooden playground. The park has been popular since the 1800s, when it was used for lawn games and dances. It fell into disrepair after World War II, but was eventually restored to its former glory and is now beloved for its grassed areas, shady trees and bay views.



Tuckey Track

Starting at the historic Sullivan Bay (a lovely spot for a dip), this track takes you past Sorrento Sailing Couta Boat Club through residential streets and the Tuckey Reserve, then down to Diamond Bay and the Mount St Paul Lookout, which has 360-degree views.



Sorrento Back Beach and Rock Pool

Survey the wild beauty of Bass Strait from the back beach and, at low tide, explore a phenomenal rock pool. From the beach, you can take the five-minute stair climb to Coppin's Lookout and enjoy the view, walk along the track to Sphinx Rock, Portsea Village or London Bridge (4km) or head the other way towards Koonya Back Beach (3.6km).



Aurora Spa

If you're in need of rest and respite, step inside this luxurious subterranean bath house and spa in the Continental Hotel. The all-weather bath house offers an 11-step journey through such rituals as warm and cold pools, an aromatherapy steam room, salt therapy room, traditional sauna, 'Glacial Mist Room' and more. Float rooms and spa treatments are also available at this wellness mecca.



Marlo Spa

A long-time Sorrento treasure that is now housed in the iconic Hotel Sorrento, Marlo Spa is the place to go for such beauty treatments as pedicures and sumptuous spa treatments - many of them inspired by ancient Ayurvedic (Indian medicine) rituals. You can also book a range of delicious 'Steam Lounge Rituals' in Marlo's steam room.



Ocean Beach Yoga Ocean Beach is our resident

yoga studio - and it's a gem. Located just behind the dunes of Sorrento Back Beach, the studio is wonderfully lightfilled and overlooks a canopy of tea-tree and other coastal natives. Maggie and her team are on-site every day and offer a variety of yoga classes from restorative practices such as Yin and Gentle yoga to the more vigorous Sculpt and Vinvasa Flow.



Recovery Deck at Recreation Sorrento

As well as a fully equipped gym and fitness studio, those adventurous enough to experiment with contrast (hot and cold) therapy. 


