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

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# Welcome to the 2026 Sorrento Writers Festival

Sorrento Writers Festival's mission is to bring writers and readers together.

We want to create meaningful, life-changing conversations in ways that are mutually respectful and stimulating – all in a welcoming environment.

In April 2026, our annual gathering kicks off again. We will introduce some of Australia's finest thinkers, leaders and creators to an eager and open-minded beachside community. We will create curiosity. We'll watch audiences bear witness to some extraordinary stories, and we will provide opportunities for you to meet your favourite authors.

In recent months, we have seen writers' festivals around the world grapple with controversy and upheaval. This uneven terrain has caused significant anguish among our industry colleagues, writers and audiences. For the first time, many Australians are asking: 'What exactly are writers' festivals and why do they matter?'

Day one of our four-day event – Thursday April 23 – is World Book Day. This serendipitous moment affords a chance to reflect on the capacity of books, writers, libraries and literary festivals to make the world a better place. My feeling is, we need this session right now, just as we need the Friday discussion that argues for the restoration and re-affirmation of humanities – in school and university curricula, in our daily discussions, in our lives.

Sorrento Writers Festival remains focused on doing what we do best – putting on a world-class festival in a small and beautiful beachside town. We are committed to upholding small-l liberal values, human rights and courtesy. We treasure our nation's diversity and we encourage civilised and respectful discussions.

This does not mean we lack courage. Over four days at Sorrento, our speakers will tackle many big issues. They'll discuss good leadership and how to nurture it, the future of two-party politics in Australia, the rise of divisive behaviour and public hate-speak, geo-political conflicts and land grabs, a changing climate, racism, social activism, our deepening relationship with AI, science doubters and fact deniers, the importance of truth telling, journalism's role in a changed media landscape – and so much more.

We are confident audiences will seek out these conversations. Ticket sales from previous years confirm our visitors are prepared to delve into the weeds of murky politics, power elites, big money and bad behaviour.



# Young Readers

The Sorrento Writers Festival's mission to improve literacy and enrich learning through books and storytelling continues in 2026. This year, we are delighted to once again present a dedicated program for local primary and secondary schools, alongside our Family Afternoon on Saturday April 25.

In 2025, more than 400 local students participated in Festival education sessions – a number we are proud to grow again in 2026.

Across two days, students from St Joseph's and Sorrento Primary Schools will welcome a dynamic line-up of Australia's leading children's authors, illustrators and storytellers, including Stuart Wilson, Sally Rippin, Jane Godwin, Andrew McDonald, Ben Wood, Thomas Mayo, Corey Tutt, Andrew Daddo and many more. Through interactive sessions, students will engage directly with the creators behind the books they love – sparking imaginations, curiosity and a lifelong love of reading.

Secondary students in Years 8-12 from Rosebud and Dromana Secondary Colleges will visit the Festival to participate in our 'Shakespeare Unpacked' events, exploring three Shakespearean works currently studied in their curriculum. These sessions bring classic texts to life, deepening understanding while connecting classroom learning with live conversation and performance.

Senior Literature and English students are also invited to attend selected Festival sessions free of charge, thanks to the generosity of donors who have specifically contributed to support youth access and participation.

We warmly invite young families from across the region to join us for our Family Afternoon on Saturday April 25, following the Anzac Day commemorations in Sorrento's main street. Full program details are available on our website.

Esther Anatolitis is the author of *When Australia Became a Republic* and *Place, Practice, Politics*, editor of *Essays that Changed Australia*, and

former editor of *Meanjin* (2022-25). One of Australia's most influential advocates for the arts and creative civic engagement, Esther has led arts and media organisations across all artforms and practice modes, served many arts and government boards, and is co-chair of the Australian Republic Movement.

## Sarah Arachchi

Sarah Arachchi is a paediatrician who works in both public and private practice. She is an active member of the Women in Medicine Committee at AMA Victoria, where she helps organise events and discussions relevant to women in medicine. Her memoir, *Brown. Female. Doctor.*, is an insightful heart-warming story of a young woman's experience through immigration, education and medical training.

## Evelyn Araluen

Evelyn Araluen is a Goorie and Koori poet, editor and researcher. Her debut poetry collection, *Dropbear*, won the 2022 Stella Prize and the Australian Book Industry Award's 2022 Small Publisher's adult book of the year, and was shortlisted for the Premier's Awards of NSW, Queensland and Victoria. Her work has also received the Nakata Brophy Prize for young Indigenous writers, the Judith Wright Poetry Prize and a Melbourne Prize professional development award. Her debut essay collection, *The First Time I Thought I Was Dying*, won the 2021 Quentin Bryce Award, and she received the 2025 Kill Your Darlings creative non-fiction essay prize. An award-winning photographer and artist, Sarah's work has been commissioned internationally, spanning fiction, non-fiction and visual arts.

## Toby Walsh

Toby Walsh is a world-leading researcher in AI (artificial intelligence). He is a professor of AI at the University of New South Wales and leads a research group at Data61, Australia's Centre of Excellence for ICT Research. He has been elected a fellow of the Association for the Advancement of AI and has won the prestigious Humboldt research award. He has held research positions in England, Scotland, France, Germany, Italy, Ireland and Sweden.

## Sally Warhaft

Sally Warhaft is a Melbourne broadcaster, anthropologist and writer. She is the host of *The Fifth Estate*, the Wheeler Centre's live series focusing on journalism, politics, media and international relations, and *The Leap Year*, a Wheeler Centre podcast about Australians' lives in the fog of the Covid pandemic. She is a former editor of *The Monthly* and the author of the bestselling book *Well May We Say: The Speeches that Made Australia*.

## Don Watson

Don Watson is the author of many critically acclaimed books, including *Caledonia Australis*, *Recollections of a Bleeding Heart*, *American Journeys*, *The Bush* and *The Passion of Private White*. He has twice won *The Age* Book of the Year, in addition to the National Biography Award, the Alfred Deakin Essay Prize, the Australian Literary Studies Association Book of the Year, a Walkley Award, the NSW Premier's Award, the Queensland Literary Award and the Independent Booksellers Book of the Year, twice.

## Nadia Wheatley

Nadia Wheatley has published a number of award-winning works of history and biography, but her latest book, *Strange New World: Belsen's First Year of Freedom*, represents a new direction. It was inspired by a visit to the site of the displaced persons camp in Germany where survivors of Bergen-Belsen made their home, and where the author's father was the hospital superintendent.

## Kate Wild

Kate Wild is an investigative journalist whose work with distinguished teams at the ABC has been recognised with three Walkley Awards and a Logie. Her reports from Darwin, where she lived from 2010 to 2016, laid the groundwork for a Four Corners story on juvenile detention that prompted the calling of the Royal Commission into the Protection and Detention of Children in the Northern Territory. Her first book, *Waiting for Elijah*, was published in 2018 and her recent book, *The Red House*, was released in 2025.

## Lisa Wilkinson

Lisa Wilkinson AM began a groundbreaking publishing career as the youngest-ever editor of *Dolly* at 21, then spent 10 years leading the iconic *Cleo* magazine. After more than a decade co-hosting the Nine Network's *Today Show*, she joined the Ten Network in 2017 as host of the prime-

time, award-winning *The Project*. Her new book, *The Titanic Story of Evelyn*, the untold story of the only Australian-born Titanic survivor, is to be released in April 2026.

## Marian Wilkinson

Marian Wilkinson is a multi-award-winning journalist with a career that has spanned radio, television, online and print. She has covered politics, national security, refugee issues and climate change as well as serving as a foreign correspondent in Washington D.C. for *Sydney Morning Herald* and *The Age*. She was executive producer and senior reporter of the ABC's *Four Corners* program. She is the author of several books. Her latest work is the *Quarterly Essay*, *Woodside Vs. the Planet*, analysing Australia's gas industry and its battles with the climate movement.

## Niall Williams

Niall Williams was born in Dublin and lives in County Clare. He has written three plays, ten novels and, with wife Christine Breen, has co-authored five books of non-fiction about their life in Clare. The latest is *In Kiltumper*, a *Year in an Irish Garden*. Niall's novels have been nominated for numerous awards, including the Man Booker Prize, The Irish Times Literature Prize, and The Dublin Impac Award. Most recently, *Time of the Child* was awarded the Kerry Group novel of the year. His novel, *Four Letters of Love*, was an international bestseller and was made into a major feature film.

## Pip Williams

Pip Williams, the author of essays, memoir, poetry and companion novels, is best known for *The Dictionary of Lost Words* and *The Bookbinder of Jericho*. *The Dictionary of Lost Words* won multiple Australian awards, was longlisted for the International Dublin Literary Award, shortlisted for the Walter Scott Prize, selected for the Reese Witherspoon Book Club, and became a *New York Times* bestseller.

He has written a social history, *Glad All Over: The Countdown Years 1974-1987*. A collection of his newspaper profiles, *Up Close: 28 Lives of Extraordinary Australians*, was published by Pan Macmillan. Peter runs Narrative Publishing, a Melbourne-based publishing house helping people and businesses publish their personal/corporate stories.

## Caroline Wilson

Caroline Wilson is a Walkley Award-winning sports journalist, broadcaster and co-presenter of the *Don't Shoot the Messenger* podcast. Caroline's numerous awards include a Lifetime Achievement Award from the Australian Sports Commission (2010), the Graham Perkin Australian Journalist of the Year Award (2013) and the Melbourne Press Club's Lifetime Achievement Award (2021).

## Sarah Wilson

Sarah Wilson is a multi-*New York Times* and Amazon bestselling author, social philosopher, international keynote speaker and philanthropist. She founded the global *I Quit Sugar* movement, edited *Cosmopolitan Australia* and hosted *MasterChef Australia*. Her books include *First, We Make the Beast Beautiful* and the US Gold Nautilus Prize-winning *This One Wild and Precious Life*. Her next book, *I Eat the Stars: How to Live Fully and Beautifully in a Collapsing World* will be released in May.

## Stuart Wilson

Stuart Wilson is the author of *The 113th Assistant Librarian* (and its sequel, *Lost in a Book*) and the *Prometheus High* series. An omnivore when it comes to devouring stories, he lives in Naarm/Melbourne with his wife and son.

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# Our Beautiful Sorrento

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The Mornington Peninsula can be particularly beautiful in the autumn, when the mornings are fresh, the days mild and the Bay still pleasantly warm for swimming.

Sorrento is unique in that it's located on the skinny end of the peninsula, where it's walking distance between the calm, pristine beaches of Port Phillip Bay and the wild, rugged Bass Strait. Our slice of the peninsula is home to lush parks, awe-inspiring walks and magical places to take a dip.

As well as offering plenty of ways to immerse yourself in the natural world, our pretty town features several spots to dust off the cobwebs or find a sense of serenity. Those looking to boost wellbeing can do it here in Sorrento.



## Sorrento Foreshore and Jetty

If time is of the essence, explore Sorrento's foreshore and jetty – the backdrop in several scenes of Hannie Rayson's classic play, *Hotel Sorrento*. It's also the site of what was once Erlandsen's Sea Baths, which featured diving boards and saltwater baths heated by briquettes, plus an adjoining tearoom. Festival venue The Baths now stands in its place.

## Sorrento-Portsea Artists' Trail

What could be better than blending exercise, jaw-dropping vistas and art? This trail takes in 14 of our most stunning locations through the eyes of such artists as Sir Arthur Streeton, Arthur Boyd and John Perceval. Journey between each reproduced painting by car or foot, starting at Websters Corner Beach (local tip: grab a coffee from nearby St Paul's General Store before embarking) and then wind your way via Sorrento Park through part of the Millionaire's Walk in Portsea, as well as London Bridge. Your last stop is the eternally charming Diamond Bay.

## Sorrento Historic Park

Adjacent to local institution *Hotel Sorrento*, Sorrento Park has manicured lawns, flower gardens and large trees, as well as picnic tables and a wooden playground. The park has been popular since the 1800s, when it was used for lawn games and dances. It fell into disrepair after World War II, but was eventually restored to its former glory and is now beloved for its grassed areas, shady trees and bay views.



# Our Beautiful Sorrento



## Tuckey Track

Starting at the historic Sullivan Bay (a lovely spot for a dip), this track takes you past Sorrento Sailing Club Boat Club through residential streets and the Tuckey Reserve, then down to Diamond Bay and the Mount St Paul Lookout, which has 360-degree views.

## Sorrento Back Beach and Rock Pool

Survey the wild beauty of Bass Strait from the back beach and, at low tide, explore a phenomenal rock pool. From the beach, you can take the five-minute stair climb to Coppin's Lookout and enjoy the view, walk along the track to Sphinx Rock, Portsea Village or London Bridge (4km) or head the other way towards Koonya Back Beach (3.6km).

## Aurora Spa

If you're in need of rest and respite, step inside this luxurious subterranean bath house and spa in the Continental Hotel. The all-weather bath house offers an 11-step journey through such rituals as warm and cold pools, an aromatherapy steam room, salt therapy room, traditional sauna, 'Glacial Mist Room' and more. Float rooms and spa treatments are also available at this wellness mecca

## Marlo Spa

A long-time Sorrento treasure that is now housed in the iconic Hotel Sorrento, Marlo Spa is the place to go for such beauty treatments as pedicures and sumptuous spa treatments – many of them inspired by ancient Ayurvedic (Indian medicine) rituals. You can also book a range of delicious 'Steam Lounge Rituals' in Marlo's steam room.

## Ocean Beach Yoga

Ocean Beach is our resident yoga studio – and it's a gem. Located just behind the dunes of Sorrento Back Beach, the studio is wonderfully lightfilled and overlooks a canopy of tea-tree and other coastal natives. Maggie and her team are on-site every day and offer a variety of yoga classes – from restorative practices such as Yin and Gentle yoga to the more vigorous Sculpt and Vinyasa Flow.

## Recovery Deck at Recreation Sorrento

As well as a fully equipped gym and fitness studio, Recreation Sorrento has added a 'Recovery Deck' for those adventurous enough to experiment with contrast (hot and cold) therapy. Spend 20 or 50 minutes moving between an infrared sauna and ice bath, taking deep breaths along the way. It's the perfect place to focus on your body and experience autumn invigoration.



# Our Venues

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The Sorrento Writers Festival is fortunate to have access to some of the town's most beautiful spaces. We have rooms with views, rooms with character and buildings that date back to the late 1800s. We thank our friends from those community organisations that support our Festival with a 'come and use our space' welcome. From the bowls club to the RSL, the spirit of Sorrento is alive and well.



## **The Continental Sorrento and InterContinental Sorrento**

Our Festival Hub is The Continental Sorrento, one of the Mornington Peninsula's architectural gems. Built in 1875 by Melbourne theatre impresario George Coppin, The Continental's two main Festival spaces are the Halcyon Hall and the Grand Ballroom.

Our Festival bookshop, run by Avenue Bookstore, will be located in the Coppin Lounge on level one of The Continental Sorrento. You will find the Festival Box Office on the ground floor just near the stairs in front of the Barlow Room. With the InterContinental Sorrento next door and a selection of bars, restaurants and coffee spots, The Continental Sorrento will be buzzing with activity over the Festival weekend.

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
# Festival Team


